Career Reflections with Retired SFFD Chief Joanne Hayes-White

Recently, retired SFFD Chief Joanne
Hayes-White was recognized at the San
Francisco Historical Society's annual
award ceremony and luncheon, which
honors people who have made significant
contributions to San Francisco's history
or culture. Past recipients have included
Willie Brown, Father Paul Fitzgerald,
the President of USF, Alonzo King (Lines
Ballet), as well as numerous historians.

SFFCU recently sat down with Hayes-White who shared reflections on her career and civic leadership, the city of San Francisco, and her long-time relationship as a member of SFFCU.

You were recently honored at the SF Historical Society luncheon. What does it mean to be recognized at this prestigious event?

San Francisco means the world to me, having been born and raised here and dedicating my career to public service. I greatly admire the SF Historical Society and all that it stands for, like the values of our city, where we came from, how we were built and where we are heading. It was an honor to receive this award and share the distinction with other recipients before me.

Your career has been in service to San Francisco. What are some highlights of your experience serving the city?

I gave nearly 30 years of service in the SFFD, including 15 years as Chief. During my time, I met many wonderful people, made good friends, and hired over 1,200 members as Chief, which has a lasting impact on the future of the department. I'm proud of the sacrifices members make every day in serving our community, often during difficult circumstances. Despite the long days, the years flew by. I have three sons now, and the oldest is a firefighter with SFFD.

What are you most proud of about our city?

A lot has been said recently about San Francisco, but what gives me hope is this city is resilient. From the 1906 earthquake and fires, and then Loma Prieta in 1989. We've experienced economic booms and busts, and even a global pandemic. But San Francisco is like a phoenix rising from the ashes, and I know we will come back. It may take time and the persistence of all of us to invest in our small businesses, to be good residents, to get involved in our community, and show the world that we can return San Francisco back to greatness.

What are you doing these days?

In 2022, I was asked to come out of retirement and work for Senator Dianne Feinstein's office as Northern California Director. Senator Feinstein was a pillar of our community, she was always a champion of the SFFD, and I learned so much from her. Upon the passing of Senator Feinstein, I was asked and agreed to remain in my position and support Senator Laphonza Butler. Senator Butler is an impressive leader and it's a privilege working for her.

How long have you been a member of SFFCU? Any reflections on your relationship with SFFCU?

I joined in 1990 and it's been a wonderful relationship. I love the friendliness of the staff; it feels like they are an extension of the firehouse. My mother was a member of the credit union and all three of my sons are too. My parents always instilled in me a strong sense of fiscal responsibility, which I've tried to pass down to my sons whether through allowance, or Christmas money, what have you. While you can spend some money, it's important to save for the future.
